Greetings from the DDSB Indigenous Education Department!

Our curriculum team has been hard at work creating resources and professional learning opportunities for students and educators that support our district priorities to uphold and promote distinct Indigenous rights.

Teachers have engaged in learning about the significance of Orange Shirt Day, understanding Cultural Appropriation vs.Appreciation, and Treaties Education.

Grade 11 English educators participated in an NBE Book Festival where they were able to interact with several Indigenous authors from diverse nations.

The New Teacher Induction Program (NTIP) has been engaged in a learning session that includes practical instructional strategies and curated Indigenous authored resources to support student-centred learning environments.

Indigenous youth and families have attended a variety of engagement opportunities to date. Tom Cowie spent the day discussing Williams Treaties, Roger Daybutch and Dean Sayers visited to give a talk on the Robinson Huron Treaty litigation process, Beanie John came to hoop dance with families, and Roger Daybutch returned for a Winter Solstice gathering with families in December. We are committed to supporting Indigenous Education in the district and will continue to offer community connections for Indigenous students and families throughout the year.


Indigenous youth have had the opportunities to tour Durham College, Ontario Tech University, University of Toronto, and York University (where they attended a football game). The Aboriginal Post Secondary Information Program (APSIP) also made three stops in Durham to support Indigenous youth in all regions of the district.

The district has hosted Indigenous guest speakers in our Speaker Series, including Chief Kelly LaRocca from Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation, and Dr.Chadwick Cowie, from Hiawatha First Nation. All employees are invited to attend these after-school learning sessions that will continue to be offered throughout the year.



The Salmon Revitalization Program is up and running again in partnership with

OFAH. Schools participating in this four-day program to understand the impacts of colonization on Atlantic Salmon and the salmon life cycle. Salmon will once again be released by students in the Spring. Families will again have the opportunity to participate in salmon release in May.








