Depending on the nature of the volunteer position, it may teach skills such as leadership, communication, organization, and project management. Through community service, students can apply in-class education to real-world scenarios to help prepare them for employment and transition to responsible adulthood.

Post-secondary institutions with a holistic admission process prefer applicants who have completed volunteer work as it shows passion, dedication, and social responsibility. Such students are also likely to be active participants in campus life. Despite the benefits of volunteerism, grades and test scores remain the primary consideration for admission.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITY FACTS:

- All students working towards an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) must complete 40 hours of Community Involvement.
- Students can start accumulating their hours in the summer before entering Grade 9.
- Community involvement activities must be completed outside scheduled class time, not part of a credit course, unpaid, and completed by end of Grade 12.
- Complete the <u>Community Involvement Activity Record</u> form with accurate information and signatures. Completed records are to be submitted to the school.
- Find a list of eligible activities on the second page of the Community Involvement Activity Record.

MARCH IS RAMADAN

Ramadan and its significance to Muslims

Ramadan is a holy month of fasting, introspection, and prayer for Muslims, followers of Islam. It is celebrated as the month in which the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) received the initial revelations of the Quran, the holy book of Islam. The Quran states:

"The month of Ramadan [is that] in which was revealed the Quran, guidance for the people and clear proofs of guidance and criterion. So whoever sights [the new moon of] the month, let him fast it."

Fasting is one of the 5 pillars of Islam; Muslims fast from dawn to sunset each day, refraining from eating, drinking, smoking, and unkind or impure thoughts and words and immoral behaviour.

Ramadan in 2023

Ramadan may begin at sunset on Wednesday, March 22, and end on the evening of Thursday, April 20. These dates are subject to moon sightings and may be one day before or after the estimated dates. Ramadan is the ninth month of the 12-month Islamic calendar, which is a lunar calendar based on the phases of the moon. As a result, Ramadan does not start on the same date each year and moves back 11 days every Gregorian year.

The Meaning of Ramadan

Ramadan is a time of self-restraint and self-reflection, with fasting seen as a way to cleanse the soul and show empathy for those who are less fortunate. Fasting is an exercise in self-control and Ramadan is a time for people to work on being more patient, tolerant, and mindful of the people around them. It is a moment to reflect and work on being better people.

During Ramadan, Muslims attend mosques more frequently, read the entire Quran, and pray special congregational night prayers. It is common for mosques to host large Iftars, especially for the poor and needy. Muslims use this time to socialize with colleagues and friends (Muslim or non-Muslim) by inviting them to Iftar parties. Different cultures have different traditions during Ramadan, whether it is special food they must cook or eating Iftar with extended family. Islamic tenets such as generosity have inspired most of these traditions, including sharing food and inviting guests to partake in Iftar.

Many Muslims also donate money to charities during the month, and a lot of Islamic charities organize food packs for people locally and in poorer countries or refugee camps. Donating to charity, also known as Zakat, is particularly important during the holy month.

The Rules of Ramadan

Muslims who have reached puberty and are in good health fast during Ramadan. However, the sick, elderly, travelers, pregnant women, and nursing mothers are exempt, although they are required to make up for the missed fast days later (if they can) or alternatively help feed the poor. The first pre-dawn meal of the day during Ramadan is called "suhoor," and the fast is broken with a meal known as "iftar."

Eid al-Fitr

The conclusion of Ramadan is marked with a celebration known as Eid al-Fitr, or the Feast of Fast-Breaking. It is the first day after Ramadan ends and in many cultures lasts for three days. On the day of Eid al-Fitr, Muslims wake up early and dress in their finest clothes to attend the Eid prayers. After prayers, they wish each other a happy Eid or 'Eid Mubarak' in Arabic before spending the rest of the day with their extended families, enjoying food and sharing gifts with children and loved ones. There

are many Eid traditions centered around family, food, generosity, and festivities.

PIC SCC Training Sessions

The PIC provided three training sessions for SCCs across the District to support the vital work of SCCs. The first session, *Running Effective SCC Meetings*, was held on November 24. Facilitated by Dawn White, Principal at G.L. Roberts CVI, this session offered attendees the basics of serving on school councils. Effective school councils prioritize and support student learning, promote meaningful parental and community involvement, and actively seek input from their school community. Other topics discussed included communication as a key to ensuring strong partnerships and strategies for resolving conflicts.

The second session, *How to Attract and Engage Members of Your SSC*, was held on November 24. This session featured presenter Kristen McKinnon who included suggestions on creating dynamic meetings and breaking down barriers to attending and being a part of a school council. Some of the tips were offering food, childcare, scheduling different meeting times, and alternate formats for meetings (virtual, in-person, hybrid, breakfast meetings, walk and talk, after school, and evening meetings).

The third session, *Finance 101 for SCC Chairs and Treasurers*, was held on January 25. This session was facilitated by Melissa Durward, Senior Manager of Finance, DDSB, and Sid Lashley, Internal Auditor, DDSB.

The presenters gave insight into activities, equipment, and resources that school councils can utilize for fundraising and subsidy. The presentation also gave an overview of school budgets, block budgets, and school-generated funds.

The presentations were informative and engaging. Approximately 120 people attended the sessions. A fourth training session focusing on SCCs Bylaws will be held on April 24. All are encouraged to attend. For more information about SCC, please view the DDSB School Community Council Handbook.
