Parent Engagement Series

The Parent Engagement Speaker Series welcomed two Indigenous presenters this year.

In March, we were honoured to have **Dr. Pam Palmater**, a Mi'kmaw lawyer, professor, author, and social justice activist from Ugpi'ganjig (Eel River Bar First Nation) who spoke about Indigenous rights, social justice, and human rights. Professor Palmater welcomed and answered many questions across a range of topics from an enthralled audience.

In early May, we were joined by **Dr. James Makokis**, a Cree Two-Spirit physician and strong advocate for marginalized populations, particularly Indigenous and 2SLGBTQIA peoples. He has been recognized both nationally and internationally for his approach to medicine by combining traditional Cree and Western medicine in his practice. With his partner Anthony Johnson by his side, Dr. Makokis also won Season 7 of The Amazing Race Canada. He gave a deeply moving presentation that encompassed Indigenous learning, respect for the land, and an empathetic understanding of the challenges faced by the 2SLGBTQIA community.

Both speakers presented Indigenous ways of knowing, learning, and an understanding that enriched all attendees. The Parent Engagement Committee would like





to thank everyone involved in the logistics, planning, backstage work, and countless tasks who worked together seamlessly so that the virtual sessions appeared effortless!

We look forward to more speakers next year and welcome your suggestions for topics and presenters.

The Living Compendium: An Evening of Engagement and Reciprocity

In June 2020, after sharing the census data with the community, the DDSB made a commitment to the Black community to report on the work being done to challenge, address, and dismantle anti-Black racism. On May 18, the DDSB welcomed parents, guardians, caregivers, community members, staff, and students to an engaging evening of sharing and continuing the conversation in shaping the "how" guided by the DDSB's Human Rights, Anti-Discrimination and Anti-Racism Policy. The theme for the evening was The Living Compendium: An Evening of Reciprocity.

The event was held at the Abilities Centre in Whitby with more than 200 people in attendance. High school and elementary students and staff talked about and demonstrated the ways in which race is being affirmed and protected in schools and classrooms. Black families and caregivers had the opportunity to inquire about how this intentional and focused work has positively impacted school





climate, curriculum content, and student success. The elementary and secondary forums exhibited a wide array of booths that featured the DDSB's many race-affirming programs and initiatives for students from early years through Grade 12 as well as student-led groups.

Ontario Court Justice Donald McLeod, the keynote for the event, began the evening by encouraging parents, guardians, and caregivers to be fervently and proactively involved and present in all aspects of their children's lives. The evening ended with an

open forum facilitated by Justice McLeod, where attendees had the opportunity to provide feedback on the work displayed during the event and give input on next steps for the DDSB.

Parents commended the DDSB for the work done and recommended the following:

- Continued work to embed Black excellence throughout all subjects
- Accountability by educators to parents and community
- More partnerships between home and family
- Greater Trustee involvement and advocacy

Durham Partners Symposium

On Saturday, May 27, Parent Engagement hosted the annual Durham Partners Symposium. We were joined by Perdita Felicien, the keynote speaker and a former DDSB student, along with Holly Richard, Saroya Tinker, Alyson Schafer, and Natasha Halliday. Speakers presented various topics relating to fostering resilience in children and supporting their mental health and well-being. Feedback from the event was beyond what could have been imagined, and all of the speakers were so well received. Everyone who registered received a copy of Perdita's book, *My Mother's Daughter*, and had the opportunity to speak with the guest speakers.
