

Regional SCC

In February, the PIC hosted the first in-person Regional SCC meeting since 2019. Administrators, SCC Chairs and designates were invited to attend an evening including a panel of guest speakers, breakout sessions on topics relevant to SCCs, and the opportunity to network with each other at the end of the evening. The event was a great success, with almost every school represented, and positive feedback all around.

Communications

Parent Engagement produced three e-newsletters this year, featurimng information, resources and strategies for parent(s)/ guardian(s). These were shared with communities via social media, the DDSB website, and school distribution.

Parents Reaching Out (PRO) Grants

For the 2023-24 year, the PRO Grant committee approved 43 applications for both elementary and secondary schools. Common topics included social inclusion, enhancing parent involvement with children's learning through curriculum, and mental health.

Feedback from across schools was that events were well attended and facilitated positive discussions and collaboration with families.

Volunteer of Distinction

On October 24, the PIC was joined by our Trustees, Director of Education, Superintendents, Administrators and staff for the first in-person Volunteer of Distinction recognition evening since 2019. The event acknowledges and celebrates volunteers from schools across the board as nominated by their Principal and SCC for their commitment and work within the school. Volunteers were recognized in a ceremony, followed by a reception where they had the opportunity to meet with all attendees.

MESSAGE FROM THE DDSB INDIGENOUS EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

The DDSB Indigenous Education Department is pleased to welcome four new members to the team: Dawn White, System Lead Indigenous and Outdoor Education, Deb Kravis, Elementary Indigenous Education Coach, Veronica Savage, K-12 Specialized Education Instructional Facilitator, and Aanje Mullen, Secondary Indigenous Student Success Teacher. We look forward to experiencing all the valuable contributions these department members bring to the team.

We are looking forward to June and the recognition of Indigenous Histories Month. Dr. Pam Palmater provided in-servicing to central staff in May as part of the kick off to the many opportunities that schools and classrooms have to celebrate Indigenous histories and contributions.

The Salmon Revitalization Project, in partnership with Indigenous scholars and Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH), continued throughout the spring, with the culmination of this labour of love being the first salmon release day on May 10. The Elementary Indigenous Education Coaches have continued to provide in class learning related to the impacts of colonization of local waters. Elementary Coaches further support this learning by bringing classes to Duffin's Creek Environmental Centre where students can make connections between their school's local watersheds, Duffin's Creek watershed, and Treaty responsibilities.

The Elementary Indigenous Education Team, in collaboration with the Teaching and Learning Department, hosted a Salmon Symposium PD on May 8 for DDSB Teachers who have a salmon incubator in their classroom. This PD aimed to help teachers learn about the impacts of colonization on the Atlantic Salmon and to make connections to the Bring Back the Atlantic Salmon Program. Further, teachers were guided with the use of timeline poster resources to make connections with the true histories and our collective Treaty responsibilities towards the water.

Outdoor learning opportunities continue to be enjoyed by Indigenous students participating in the Akinomagaaye/Akinomoshin Program facilitated by Beedahbin Peltier and Tammy and Bernard Nelson. Indigenous Student Circles from two elementary schools meet biweekly to engage in land and language-based learning. All learning activities have connections to the Ontario Science curriculum.

Secondary engagement opportunities continue through a partnership with Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation, Durham Continuing Education, and DDSB Indigenous Education. Many adult students have been working to achieve credits as they work toward attaining their OSSD. Grade 7-10 Indigenous students interested in STEM attended a day of learning on May 21 in partnership with Ontario Tech University (OTU). Students will meet the OTU Indigenous Initiatives team and engage in a day of activities, including a tour of the wind tunnel and a cyber security information session.

Elementary and secondary Indigenous students were invited to participate in Indigenous Student Celebration Days on May 29 and June 14. Students had the opportunity to participate in workshops of their choosing as they enjoy connecting with their peers from across the district.

The Indigenous Education Department is hosting a two-week Indigenous Summer Camp for Indigenous students in grades 4-8 in July. Students will participate in land-based learning and language revitalization activities supported by Indigenous scholars and knowledge keepers. For more information about

Update from the Outdoor Environmental Education Department

In May, the Outdoor Environmental Education Department celebrated another successful Watershed Festival at Duffins Creek. Grade 6/7 students were invited to participate in outdoor activities as they expanded their knowledge about biodiversity and the importance of protecting our watersheds. Some highlights from the day included releasing Atlantic salmon into Duffins Creek, working together to solve the leaky pipe challenge and listening to Phil from Ontario Parks as he shared a wealth of fascinating facts about flora and fauna. We also partnered with Durham Master Gardeners, Durham Region's Waste and Water Management Departments, Bring Back the Salmon and our Indigenous Education Department to educate students about environmental sustainability. Secondary students from J. Clarke Richardson Collegiate and Pickering H.S. demonstrated leadership skills as they engaged elementary students in a stream study and generated awareness about Monarch Butterfly conservation efforts.



Later in the week, we ran an adventure-packed Watershed Challenge for high school students. Teams of four showcased their endurance, cooperation and naturalist skills as they participated in archery, orienteering, tree and bird identification, fire starting, team building and knot-tying events.

This spring, several groups of students had the exciting opportunity to meet with volunteers from the Ontario Turtle Conservation Centre and release rescued baby snapping turtles back into the Nonquon River. Students learned about the many challenges facing Ontario's turtles and gained awareness about how they can act to help protect turtles and their wetland habitats. Students then had the chance to meet our resident blind snapping turtle and learn about the live reptiles that we take care of at our four Outdoor Environmental Centres.

In addition to providing outdoor day trip programming for students in grades 2 to 12, we have continued to collaborate with Elementary and Secondary teachers and provide professional development experiences. We also delivered an Outdoor Learning session to new DDSB teachers as part of the New Teacher Induction Program. The focus was on outdoor experiential learning in an urban school setting and making cross curricular connections.

We want to extend a warm welcome back to Rachel Willis who is returning as our Durham Forest Summer Camp Director this year. Rachel has a Bachelor's degree in Child and Youth Studies from Trent University and is currently studying at University of Toronto to



complete her Masters in Child Study and Education.
