## **Primary Resources**

"It is very important both to **listen to** children read aloud and to continue to read to them even after they become independent, fluent readers. There are many different ways of reading together: taking turns reading pages, reading in unison and stopping to talk throughout the reading."

## Four Ways of Responding Orally to Reading



**Retell** the story, or significant parts of the story, in your own words:

- to re-experience the story;
- to recall vocabulary, ideas, information, and concepts;
- to synthesize ideas from the story.

#### **Prompts for retelling:**

- This story is about...
- I enjoyed the part where...
- I noticed that...
- This is what I remember from the story...

## **Reflect** on how you were affected by the text:

- to examine the feelings the story aroused;
- to explore questions and ideas raised by the story.

### Prompts for thinking and wondering:

- I wonder if ...
- I wonder why ...
- I felt ...
- I can picture ...
- I realize ...
- I was surprised ...
- I didn't understand ...

## **Relate** characters, places, events, and ideas from the text:

- to your life;
- to other things you know;
- to other books you have read.

## Prompts for making connections:

- I remember when I ...
- That reminds me of ...
- It was different from ...
- I read another book that also ...

#### **Review** elements of the text and the techniques used by the author to explore:

- what made you fell the way you do;
- what helped you to understand the story.

## Prompts for critical thinking:

- The author is trying to ...
- One of the main characters...
- The problem at the beginning ...
- How does the ...

#### **Primary Resources**

Here are some reading and writing activities that you may want to share with your child in your busy daily schedule:

- Read traffic, store and restaurant signs.
- Read food labels, schedules, maps, instructions, advertisements, flyers and brochures.
- Browse online for recipes, the meanings of words and places on a map.
- Write shopping lists and telephone messages.
- Write the date and time of appointments and activities on a family calendar.
- Read and write greeting cards, thank you notes or letters (printing, cursive handwriting or using a keyboard are all fine) and email and text messages.

## **Junior and Intermediate Resources**

"Lifelong success starts with strong reading and writing skills. With your support, your child will grow up to become an excellent reader with strong writing skills. You don't need a lot of special skills to help your child learn to read and write. Just spending time with your child doing everyday activities makes all the difference in the world. Here are some helpful strategies to encourage literacy...

#### **Create a daily reading time:**

- Set aside a special time each day when you can give your full attention to reading with your child.
- Find out what your child is passionate about and learn as much as you can about this topic.
- Go to the library together or browse online for material.
- Use books featuring your child's favourite character from a specific TV show.
- Use great websites from home or your local library (like the ones in the back of this guide) to read online.
- Include a spot for games, puzzles, comics or software.

This ministry guide is available in **13** languages Asking questions is a great way for your child to express their ideas!

#### If you're stuck, here are some "**talk starters**" to get your conversation going:

- What did you notice about ...
- What else could you have done...
- What would you do if ...
- What would happen if ...
- How do you know that?
- Convince me about that!

#### As you are listening

- If it's a book being read, show your child that you are enjoying the book by being curious and asking questions.
- Make connections to what he or she already knows.
- Rephrase what you are hearing.
- Be patient. Make sure your child has enough time to figure out tricky words.
- After reading, talk about interesting and puzzling parts of the book.

#### **IDEAS/CONTENT**

- What have you decided to write about? (topic)
- Why did you decide to write this? (purpose)
- Whom is your story for? (audience)
- Can you explain your ideas to a friend?
- Did you say everything that was important?

#### VOICE

- How do you want people to feel when they read this?
- Can the reader tell how you feel about this topic?
- Does this writing sound as if it's you talking?
- Will someone be interested in reading this?

### **Junior and Intermediate Resources**



#### **SENTENCE FLUENCY**

- Have you used different kinds of sentences?
- Have you used some long and some short sentences?
- Do your sentences begin in different ways?
- When you read your sentences aloud, do they sound easy and natural?

#### **ORGANIZATION**

- Do you make a plan and follow it?
- Do you have a beginning and an end?
- Do your ideas go together?
- Are your ideas in the right order?

#### **WORD CHOICE**

- Have you used interesting words?
- Have you used any words too many times?
- Can the reader 'picture' what you wrote?
- Have you chosen the best words?

#### **CONVENTIONS**

- Did you read what you wrote? (proofreading)
- Have you checked your spelling and punctuation?
- Did you write in complete sentences?
- Have you followed the rules for paragraph writing?

#### PRESENTATION

- Is your writing neat and tidy?
- Does your writing look nice on the page?
- Does your work have a title?
- Have you used pictures/charts/ diagrams well?

#### Suggestions for building a family literacy inventory

- Be seen or heard by your children reading a newspaper, magazine or sales flyer, viewing a website or talking about the latest film or music release.
- Communicate through text messages, emails, letters, thank-you cards, phone or video calls or face-to-face communication.
- Tell and retell family stories, sing songs or share cultural or bedtime stories, poems or rhymes.
- Encourage your child(ren) to join in or make up new stories, rhymes or songs.
- Read, write and talk for different purposes in your home (e.g., making grocery lists).

### Ideas for students to write about in a notebook/journal (Grades 3-6)

 descriptions of people, places, and things that are important to them;

- opinions, wonderings, wishes, thoughts, feelings, memories, dreams;
- family stories;
- useful and/or interesting information on any topic;
- interviews;
- responses to literature;
- responses to the news, music, or conversations;
- plans for a project;

- experiences;
- words and language they particularly like;
- favourite quotations or poems (or fragments of poems);
- · drawings or sketches;
